From The Board of Directors

Your Board of Directors is comprised of the officers and directors elected by the club members. The mission of the board is to chart a course for the direction during the year, overseeing the club's funds and fiduciary commitments.

Additionally, the Board is available to the members when issues important to the members arise. Members are welcome to attend the board meetings and share their concerns. The board regularly meets an hour prior to the general meeting. Additionally, board members' phone numbers and email addresses are listed in the club's roster.

During an informal board meeting, held August 21, there was mention of the repeated interference on the 145.150 repeater, especially prior to, and during nets. It was suggested that the board appeal to members for help to determine the source.

When the interference occurs, those on frequency are requested to monitor the input frequency and make note of the date and time, the member's location and relative signal strength.

This information is to be forwarded to the board and will help to pinpoint a general area. Mobiles can then be employed, armed with DF capabilities to refine the location.

ARES

In keeping with Amateur Radio's commitment to public service, some club members are also members of Amateur Radio Emergency Services, or ARES.

West Kern County ARES is affiliated with the Kern County Fire Department's office of Emergency Services. In the event of an emergency WKCARES may be called to lend assistance.

Members of ARES would be able to step into support roles, handling routine traffic, freeing up first responders to focus on critical emergency services.

ARES operates several nets, one of which takes place on the W6LIE 145.150 repeater. Other nets can be found on HF frequencies.

San Joaquin Valley ARES section hosts a net Sunday mornings at 0700, on 3.935 MHz, LSB, and is open to all ARES members.

There is also a net specific to California Emergency Service, CESN, operating on Mondays at 2000 on 3.992 MHz, LSB, and Wednesday mornings at 1000 on 7.192 MHz, LSB.

ARES is always looking for volunteers. If you are interested in lending your skills to support our local ARES, please check W6LIE.ORG for an application, or check in on the net on Monday evenings at 1900.

Notes From the ARRL

Some of the conversations around the repeater included talk about CW, often ending with the phrase "maybe someday".

ARRL has made practice sessions available for those for who someday has arrived. If you are interest you can find W1AW on these frequencies at 1300, 1600 and 1900 local time

Frequencies are 1.8025, 3.5815, 7.0475, 14.0475, 18.0975, 21.0675, 28.0675, 50.350, and 147.555 MHz.

Slow Code = practice sent at 5, 7-1/2, 10, 13 and 15 words per minute (wpm).

Fast Code = practice sent at 35, 30, 25, 20, 15, 13 and 10 wpm.

Code bulletins are sent at 18 wpm.
